Henry Buresh Alumni Award Winner

Nicole Houston Bozeman, MT

"My previous experiences paved the way for me to excel in homeschooling studies as I had learned to be disciplined, study on my own and navigate challenging situations," Mohammed wrote. "By the end of high school, my experiences and education in three different countries made me realize how technology, specifically social media, has made the world smaller and more interconnected."

To that end, Mohammed is taking computer science classes at Northern Virginia Community College and plans to further his education at George Mason. Outside the classroom he enjoys cooking, playing sports and learning about the Japanese language and culture.

Aimon Arshad (Waco, TX)

Aimon Arshad entered American School unsure of herself and what lay ahead for her in her desired career path as an elementary school teacher. She left American School with more than just an accredited high school diploma.

"I am unique because I have not let having a disability stop me from accomplishing great things, above and beyond what even those without physical disabilities have done," Aszkara wrote. "I hope to not only keep accomplishing wonderful things and having great experiences in college but also to continue serving as a light to my fellow humans."

Those great experiences in college include being a paid intern at the Young Singers of the Palm Beaches, an award-winning singing group in her community. She also received the Most Spirited Award from Maltz Jupiter Theatre and enjoys speech and debate.

Courtney Houghton (Arlington, TX)

Courtney Houghton showed heart in earning her American School diploma amidst health challenges, and now she is interested in Hill College's echocardiography program so that she can have a career helping others in need.

"The heart is an incredible, complex organ. There always seems to be more I can learn about it," Courtney wrote. "I have a passion for helping others and a strong desire to learn more about the human body itself."

While still an American School student, Courtney took classes at Tarrant County College, where she is currently studying in advance of her planned transfer to Hill.
